### Accelerated Reader:

We held a parents information workshop about our new approach to reading from Year 3 to Year 6. Your child's reading book may well look very different to that which you are used to seeing; teachers are regularly assessing the quizzes taken for each book and allocating a set of books for your child to choose from accordingly. Quizzes do not only assess your child's ability to decode the words but also their understanding of vocabulary and the story. Every book has a sticker on the inside cover which gives the book level, quiz number and points awarded for reading that book. We have not yet introduced the points accumulation to the children but it could get competitive!

Walk on Wednesday has now been replaced by Fancy Feet and Whirly Wheels which starts in November. Plans are going ahead to introduce a 20 mph zone outside school and into the village; this should be undertaken in the next 6 weeks and will hopefully keep pedestrians safer when crossing the road.



## Haydon Bridge High School:

The Open Evening for Haydon Bridge High School is on Wednesday 5<sup>th</sup> October from 4.30pm. Haydon Bridge hasn't received the best publicity recently but there have been major changes and improvements within the school over the past year. Mr Glover from HBHS is very willing to come to our school and talk to parents to answer any questions you might have. He has sent me the following information:

"The Year 7 students have made a fantastic start to their time at Haydon Bridge, parents have recently come in to school and given us feedback about how well they have settled in, the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive about the progress and well-being of the students. As part of the Year 7 transition programme, twenty two students spent an evening at Ridley Hall where they had great fun completing various outdoor challenges and slept outside in the forest under shelters that they built in teams. Groups of students completed an extended blindfold trail through the woods and along a rope trail. Students needed to communicate and work together so that they could move through the woods safely and as a unit. The groups built shelters, lit fires and then ate barbecued food prepared by staff. Everyone went for a walk later on to look at the brilliant night sky and meet the "Giant of Ridley Hall". Despite some rain in the morning the students returned to school by 8.30am and spent the day at school reflecting on their happy and character building experience."

# Reflecting on academic standards at HBHS:

This year has seen some excellent results for Haydon Bridge students including;

- A2 proportion of students achieving A\*-B and A\*-C has increased
- 5 A\*-C inc Eng & maths improved from 2015
- Academic progress (value added) is positive
